Band Members Abroad - Musical Greetings from Amsterdam...

This year, band member Sandra Fordyce-Voorham has taken a year's sabbatical to the Netherlands with her family. She was kind enough to send through this article.

Hello to you all – it has been great to keep in contact with you via the email and through Newsbeat – the SACB certainly has some great gigs coming up with lots of variety to provide for the musical interest and enjoyment of both players and audience.

As you might know, I am in Amsterdam with my family for our collective experience of living, going to school and working as a Dutch family for the year. We are living in a village close by to Schiphol Airport and in bike riding distance to Amsterdam central. Our nearest point of interest is the Concertgebouw – today (Sunday March 2) my parents-in-law are attending a performance of Bach's St Matthew's Passion in the lead up to the Easter season. Nearby to the Concertgebouw, and also on the Musuemplein, is the Music Conservatorium of Amsterdam and the fabulous Broekmans and Van Poppel shop (www.broekmans.com) – print music, books and classical CDs can be purchased here. I have bought several items of print music here in the past – Schumann's Romances and a couple of days ago, Mozart's Adagio for Clarinet and 3 Basset Horns.

*In the process of packing up our Melbourne house, I rediscovered a musical treat of my own – my schoolgirl diaries –whereupon I discovered that Nancy was my clarinet teacher more than thirty years ago whilst I was a student at the Mac Robertson Girls' High School. It was an absolute revelation to us both and a shared delight for me to read aloud to Nancy my school girl interpretations of my lessons, especially my joy in sharing little trios with Nancy on flute and a fellow musical student, Helen Champion on bassoon (and as Nancy recalls, who went on to become an accomplished bassoonist). It now comes as no surprise to me that my musical drive has always been embedded in shared music making – now with my wonderful colleagues in the SACB - which contrasts with my husband Jan-Willem (who remains resistant to my urges for him to join me at SACB, preferring to play his tenor sax as a soloist for his own enjoyment)

All this came as Nancy and I sat together enjoying a lip smacking lunch of salmon fillet with dill on a Greek salad and a chilled glass of sauvignon blanc at Doyle's, overlooking the boats at Mordialloc Creek, on one of the last glorious early summer days before our departure to The Netherlands.

Dear Members and Friends of Southern Area Concert Band,

I've just picked up 20 new Entertainment Books fresh from the 2008 launch and have just been browsing this year's offerings.

A Bit of Musical Humour...

A company chairman was given a ticket for a performance of Schubert's Unfinished Symphony. Since he was unable to go, he passed the invitation to the company's Quality Assurance Manager.

The next morning, the chairman asked him how he enjoyed it and, instead of a few plausible observations, he was handed a memorandum:

- 1. For a considerable period, the oboe players had nothing to do. Their number should be reduced, and their work spread over the whole orchestra, thus avoiding peaks of inactivity.
- 2. All twelve violins were playing identical notes. This seems unnecessary duplicative, and the staff of this section should be drastically cut. If a large volume of sound is really required, this could be obtained through the use of an amplifier.
- 3. Much effort was involved in playing the demi-semiquavers. This seems an excessive refinement, and it is recommended that all notes should be rounded up to the nearest semiquaver. If this were done, it would be possible to use trainees instead of craftsmen.
- 4. No useful purpose is served by repeating with horns the passage that has already been handled by the strings. If all such redundant passages were eliminated, the concert could be reduced from two hours to twenty minutes.

In light of the above, one can only conclude that had Schubert given proper attention to these matters, he probably would have had the time to finish his symphony.
